Describe the overall structure. How does this fit in the IMRAD model. Do the chapters/paragraphs follow a logic and are the chapters and paragraphs linked. How does the structure support the transfer of the main messages of the manuscript?

Exercise A

- The conceptual model/ the theoretical background/ the theory the manuscript is building on

Describe the building blocks that form the (theoretical, earlier work) basis for the approach as presented in the manuscript. How are the chosen approach, the main topic, the chosen variables or conceptual model, the hypothesis and the techniques and methodology as well as the data used justified?

Exercise A

- The methodology used/ when relevant also the data used

Describe the methodology used; literature review, desk research, interviews/ comments, survey or use of other data sources. Qualitative or quantitative. Details of the type of analysis, used techniques.

What data sets have been used?

How do the methodology and data contribute to the main message?

Exercise A

- The main message of the manuscript in maximum 10 lines / the relevance and added value to existing knowledge and expertise

Exercise B: Developing a manuscript proposal

Identification of the topic of a manuscript to be prepared by participant: describing main messages, identifying supporting statements

You are invited to identify a topic/issue that you want to describe in a manuscript to submitted to one of the journals. This identification should be justified based on

- A description of the relevance, what is new/innovative, who should read it
- Of the main messages that the manuscript will give
- The main relations with existing theory/ the concepts to be included
- A rough description of the methodology and data set to be applied
- The choice of the best Journal for such a manuscript
