- Prizes awarded for the best papers in the field of official statistics written by young statistician (s).

Improving Official Statistics

Submissions should

- address and propose solutions to **pressing methodological or strategic issues** in the area of official statistics at the regional, national or international level,
- be no more than 4,000 words,
- be submitted in English and
- should not have been previously presented in a public forum or published.

A maximum of three co-authors is allowed for each submission and an author can participate in only one submission.



Improving Official Statistics

An international panel will judge submissions based on **four** criteria:

- Scientific and/or strategic merit (40%)
- Originality (20%)
- Applicability of the ideas in the practice of statistical organizations (20%)
- Quality of the exposition (20%).



60 points = Scientific and/or strategic merit (40) + Originality (20)

Improving Official Statistics

What often lets submissions down

- Applicability of the ideas in the practice of statistical organizations (20 points)
- Quality of the exposition (20 points)



Improving Official Statistics



Include a section in your submission on whether your idea

- has been applied
- has been tested
- If not, how would you recommend it be tested and/or applied
- An example, even a hypothetical example, is better than none



Improving Official Statistics



Well structured

 e.g. introduction, what is the problem you're trying to solve, how did you solve it, how did it work in practice, conclusion, lessons learnt, what do next)

Logical and focused

focus on your idea and explaining what it is and why important

Check spelling and grammar -

 Judges need to read it first then understand it. If it can't be read, it can't be understood
