

Information Regime, Statistical Production and South-South Cooperation: dimensions and potentialities.

Keywords: South–South Cooperation. Statistical production. 2010 Census. Brazil. Cape Verde.

This work presents the results of the investigation about Brazilian international cooperation, in the South-South Cooperation (CSS) modality, based on the reflection of the implemented initiatives, their results and their effectiveness. Focused on the case study of the cooperation between IBGE and the National Institute of Statistics of Cape Verde (INECV), in the sharing of digital data collection technology for the realization of the 2010 census, the work explored the potentialization of the production of census information and statistics, at the local and global levels, for use in domestic public policies and for the production of indicators against global agendas.

Using the concept of information regime and the meaning and roles of statistical knowledge for the State and society, the work also took into account the information production chains.

The concept of regime, used at different scales, was considered appropriate for reflection on international cooperation - from the “emerging global information regime” to more defined territorial and institutional scales (Cape Verde), unveiling hybrid networks composed of actors, interests, speeches, rules, artifacts and information actions.

It was concluded that although CSS can be implemented in other dimensions, it was possible to reach the objectives of cooperation. Shared technology has boosted the process of producing and disseminating information at the local level, in Cape Verde, and indirectly, to the international community, in a process of feedback of informational demands both for the countries' internal agendas and for the global agendas.
